Male Kitten Wellness Plan

Preventive Care Exam – regular exams for kittens are important in order to detect any abnormalities and to allow for discussion about important issues. The early preventive care exams are a good time to discuss any congenital or breed specific concerns, claw care, litterbox training, behavior, diet, dental care and spaying/neutering.

Vaccines – the core vaccines to be given are feline distemper (panleukopenia), feline herpesvirus, feline calicivirus, feline leukemia and rabies. It is important to provide initial protection even in kittens that are intended to be indoor only. In many cases, situations change and they become indoor/outdoor cats.

Intestinal Parasite Exam – an examination of your kitten’s stool allows for the detection of intestinal parasites which may cause illness in your kitten or be transmitted to human family members. Medications will be dispensed based on parasites found.

Feline Leukemia Test – kittens can be infected with leukemia by their mothers. It is important to know the leukemia status of kittens as that can affect decisions about multicat households, whether or not to allow the kitten outside and decisions about medical treatment.

Pre-anesthetic Bloodwork – includes a complete blood count, liver values, kidney values, blood glucose and protein level. Allows for the detection of abnormalities



that might affect anesthetic choice or choice of pain medication. Provides a baseline for future comparison.

Castration – all surgeries have IV catheters placed and are monitored both during surgery and postoperatively by registered veterinary technicians. Neutering is important to prevent pet overpopulation as well as certain behavior issues. Ideally cats should be neutered just prior to 6 months of age.

Microchip – according to one study, 41% of people looking for their lost cats considered them to be indoor-only pets. Only about 2% of lost cats ever find their way home due to a lack of identification. Assuring the identification of all pet cats, regardless of their lifestyle, is recommended to increase the prospect of lost cats being returned to their owners.

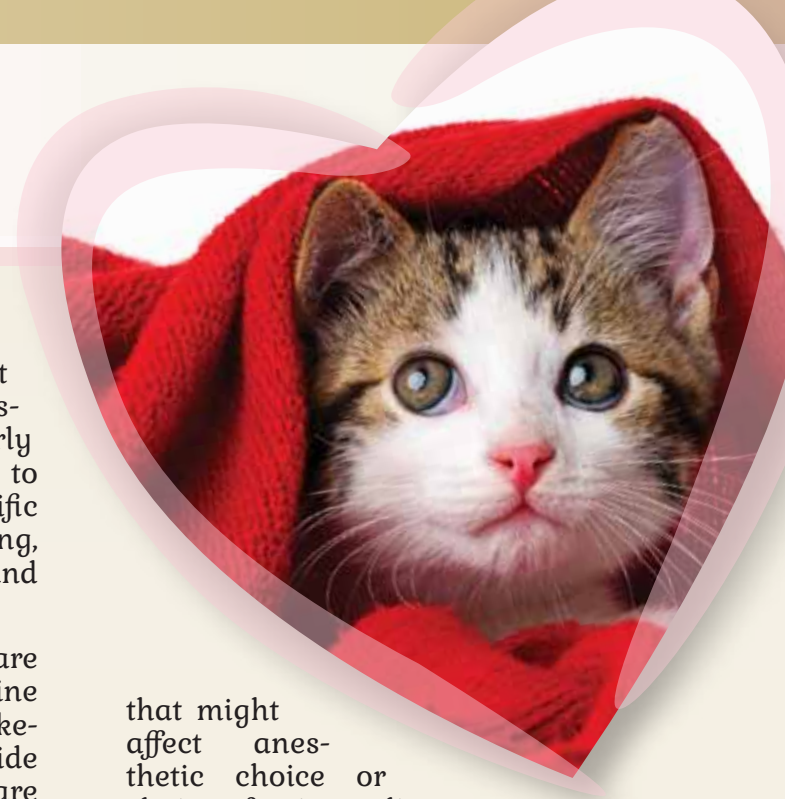

Ovariohysterectomy – all surgeries receive IV fluids and are monitored both during surgery and postoperatively by registered veterinary technicians. Spaying is important to prevent pet overpopulation as well as certain behavior issues. Ideally cats should be spayed prior to 6 months of age as this is generally the time at which they may have their first heat.

Microchip – according to one study, 41% of people looking for their lost cats considered them to be indoor-only pets. Only about 2% of lost cats ever find their way home due to a lack of identification. Assuring the identification of all pet cats, regardless of their lifestyle, is recommended to increase the prospect of lost cats being returned to their owners.
